Collection Development Practices Prior to Pandemic Challenges

- Online Content Outpacing Print Resources for most content
- Monograph acquisitions was a hybrid model – with both print & e-titles being acquired
- Collection development philosophy was an e-preferred one
- Prior to Covid-19, e-content has been acquired through Evidence Based Acquisitions, Demand Driven Acquisitions, Ebook Package Subscriptions (e.g. Academic Complete), and individual title purchases.





COVID-19 – Immediate Effects of the Pandemic

The Singapore "Circuit Breaker" : A lock down measure to limit movement

Cautious, Phased Reopening: Hybrid instruction & limited on-campus activities

Presented a set of unique challenges in practice for library

- Staff transitioned to working remotely
- Restricted access to physical library resources --- challenge for staff and library users
- High number of students needing e-resource access off-campus --increased challenge for students
- Remote learning: Increased online teaching activities -- challenge to faculty

Key Observations From User Needs Analyses

- When physical resources become unavailable or the availability is limited, the need for accessing and using e-resources becomes higher
- Need to shift collection development practices and philosophies to support online learning
- Need to ensure students, teachers and researchers can be supported with necessary resources anytime and anywhere





Rethinking Options


• Prioritising greater access to content through electronic & digital options

- Renegotiating & Relooking at current e-resource business models
- -Sourcing for new collection models to support accelerated need for digital resources
- Chanelling and reallocating funds to support new needs :
 - New acquisitions
 - -Copyright Clearances
- Reviewing licensing provisions and current access numbers to ensure equitable access to key resources
- Using data regarding user needs to inform our acquisition and collection development practices e.g. Usage data from e-textbook platform



Pivot, Flexible, Responsive: Organised Response to Collective User Needs

An organised page on COVID-19 resources : includes resources both available in our collection as well as freely available resources from journals to industry reports that specifically analyse the crisis.

Active Transformation

Print to E-copy conversions for high use titles : duplicating print with e-versions

Acquisition & Subscription of E-Textbooks for course reserves

On-demand digitization of book chapters with appropriate copyright notations

Continuous updating of temporarily free resources from academic publishers worldwide

Promote use & discovery of Open Educational Resources (OERs)

Getting permission from publishers & licensing bodies to digitise / copy content

Pay-per-use licensing via Copyright Clearance Centre



New Needs, Increased Demands : Hurdles, Challenges & Issues

- 1. Request for digitized textbooks
 - Not every print book / textbook has an electronic equivalent
- 2. Negotiation for increased access to licensed resources
 - Implications on costs, turnaround time may not be immediate

3. Copyright was an obstacle : Demands for scanned chapters and articles can only be fulfilled as allowed by legal provisions

❑ No Emergency Exceptions, no increase in legal limits

4. Proprietary resources - asking publishers for authorization, not always with favourable outcomes

The Way Forward – Thinking Aloud

- Improved agility, making changes to how we develop and access our collections
- Review print collection to determine which titles would be candidates for duplicating with ebook version
- Increasing digitization capacity interlibrary loan of Ebooks?
